From the President of Council

IT'S OPEN!

As some of you know, the walking/cycling trail at the end of Glencoe Avenue has been open for most of the summer. This short but shady path, informally dubbed The Whiskey Hollow Trail, is a great place to walk your leashed dog or just have a relaxing stroll. I would recommend a mountain bike if you intend to cycle all the way to Noblestown Road due to the uphill return route. But a hybrid or other bike is fine if you don't venture further than the left turn where the stream passes under the Parkway West. If you drive to the trailhead, park in one of the gravel areas on the right side of Glencoe and don't block any driveways. Future plans for the trail include adding benches, trash cans, and eventually a shot-and-chip surface.

On June 30th, Green Tree was formally designated a Live Well Community by County Executive Rich Fitzgerald. His presentation included the unveiling of a new logo featuring a map of Green Tree, which we will use in upcoming events. The Health and Wellness Fair was a great success and highlighted many options for better physical and mental fitness. Our borough will continue to promote and maintain programs and facilities to encourage our residents to live a healthy lifestyle. See the large banner in Green Tree Park that lists some of these amenities.

Police Chief Colin Cleary organized a public safety open house on August 2nd in conjunction with National Night Out. The police, fire department, and MRTSA EMS services showcased their equipment for the great turnout. Handouts included firefighter hats and glow sticks for the kids and everyone enjoyed the ice cream treats. National Night Out is a great way to interact with your neighbors and public safety professionals. Watch for an expansion of this event next year!

Recent Council Business:

-  Agreed to participate in the Southwestern Pennsylvania Commission Sinc-UP regional traffic signal program. Estimated cost for this project to upgrade and synchronize signals at eight intersections on Greentree Road is \$495,000. The borough has received a grant for 80% of this amount (\$396,000). We have committed to paying the remaining 20% (\$99,000) for this much-needed project.
-  Approved the transfer of a liquor license to the new Nakama Express West restaurant that is opening in Parkway Center Building #7.
-  Authorized submission of a letter of interest to ALCOSAN for a project to be included in their Green Revitalization of Our Waterways (GROW) grant program. If approved, this joint project with the Pittsburgh Water and Sewer Authority could remove up to 23 million gallons of storm water per year from the sanitary sewer system, thus reducing the amount of water needed to be treated at the ALCOSAN plant.

Octoberfest is celebrating its 20th anniversary and there are lots of new activities, including a laser light show and a rock climbing wall! Look inside for more information on our biggest event of the year!

Streets & Public Health *John Novak, Chair*

With the summer ending and cooler weather approaching, the borough is getting ready for paving of a number of streets before the winter weather sets in. Infrastructure jobs, such as sewer cleaning and relining will continue until the colder months.

The heat of the summer is winding down, and the leaves will begin to change color. The leaves then fall off the trees. With that event, people rake their leaves to the edge of the street. Public Works then vacuums up the leaves, shreds them, and takes them to our compost site where they become rich garden compost. Another leaf collection benefit includes keeping the leaves out of the storm sewers and reducing the chance of storm sewer back up during heavy rains as well as reducing maintenance costs. Additionally, keeping the leaves off the roads prevents the creation of slippery surfaces. **NOTE: When raking leaves curbside for collection, do not rake the leaves into the street. Don't allow children to play in curbside leaf piles either, as drivers may not be able to see them.**

Another issue affecting our community is the sanitary sewer consent decree. Every ALCOSAN community has to reduce storm water infiltration from ending up in the sanitary sewer system. Much of Green Tree's storm water flows into the Pittsburgh sanitary sewer lines where it mixes with the city's combined sanitary/storm sewer system. The borough has applied for a GROW (Green Revitalization of Our Waterways) grant through ALCOSAN to separate the borough's storm water from entering Pittsburgh's combined storm and sanitary sewers on Poplar Street. Green Tree Borough is partnering with the Pittsburgh Sewer & Water Authority for this project, which is estimated to cost \$500,000. The amount of funding from the grant depends upon how much storm water can be removed from the system and is based on the cost per gallon of storm water removed from the system. We have determined that on a yearly basis, 23 million gallons of storm water can be stopped from entering the ALCOSAN sanitary sewer system. We hope to have word as to the status of the grant shortly.

Also, Green Tree has been designated as a Live Well Community by Allegheny County. We have become the 25th community to be selected. To be recognized there must be a commitment to promote a healthy lifestyle such as healthy food choices at the concession stands, a smoke-free environment, and maintaining walking trails within the community. Ongoing programs encouraging healthy living and exercise also are part of Green Tree's commitment to Live Well!

Planning & Zoning

It is summer and there is a lot of construction going on in Green Tree. Unlike the last several summers though, where Greentree Road was torn up or our community was used to reroute traffic due to construction along I-279, the construction vehicles you see throughout the community are the type that brings in the new and gets rid of the old.

The following are some examples of positive investments that businesses are doing in Green Tree:

- 🌳 Robertson Heating Supply on Noblestown Road has begun an expansion project of their building.
- 🌳 The most visible example is the Bentley office building along the Parkway that has enclosed the exterior of the building and continues as planned with an expected completion date in 2017.
- 🌳 An example of addition via subtraction: the old and empty apartment buildings along Greentree Road near Aiken School are being demolished and removed from the site. Currently the owners have no other plans but green space.
- 🌳 Nakama Express restaurant is under construction in Building #7 of Parkway Center.
- 🌳 Terrain apartment complex on Mansfield Avenue continues its transformation on Mansfield Avenue from an extended stay hotel to apartments that will be rented monthly and yearly.
- 🌳 Council approved the conditional use for the construction of a Burger King restaurant in the former Reed Sports location.

Ordinances & Resolutions

Green Tree Borough Council passed the following ordinances and resolutions from June through August 2016.

Ordinances

- #1756 Amending Ordinance #1750 setting the annual rate of pay and establishing the hourly rate of pay for certain administrative employees of the Borough.
- #1757 Fixing the salaries of certain summer borough employment positions.
- #1758 Approving the editing and inclusion of certain ordinances as parts of the various component codes of the Codified Ordinances of Green Tree in the form of Supplement #8.

- #1232 Approving the transfer of Restaurant Liquor License R-9837 into Green Tree from Homestead, PA.
- #1233 Authorizing proper officers to execute agreement for Sinc-Up Project Regional Traffic Signal Program.
- #1230 Disposition of Public Records.
- #1231 Street Sweeping Agreement with PennDOT.

Public Safety Rino Lindsey, Chair

Council was pleased to receive approval on a grant in the amount of \$396,000 (80% of the cost) for the upgrade of eight (8) intersections along Greentree Road from the Southwestern Pennsylvania Corporation. The following intersections will receive upgrades that could include new controller assemblies, Emergency Vehicle Preemption Systems, radio communications, radar detection system, and battery back up systems:

- Greentree Road @ McKinney Lane
- Greentree Road @ Parkway Center Drive
- Greentree Road @ Warriors Road
- Greentree Road @ Mansfield Avenue
- Greentree Road @ I-376 Eastbound off-ramp
- Greentree Road @ Roseberry Way
- Greentree Road @ Manilla Avenues
- Greentree Road @ Carnahan Road
- Greentree Road @ Potomac

The intersection at Greentree Road and McMonagle was previously upgraded a few years ago during a joint project with Scott Township through a similar grant. The project will now move on to the design and bidding phase. We will keep you informed of the progress.

There are three items that I would like to bring to your attention:

1. The annual oral raccoon rabies baiting project in western Pennsylvania was completed in our area in early August. A vaccine packet is coated or placed inside a fishmeal block, which is very tasty to raccoons. The baits are dropped from low-flying planes or helicopters, or by local teams on foot or in vehicles. If you should find rabies baits – leave them alone, unless they are found where children and pets play. Intact baits can be safely moved to other locations, such as wooded lots, ditches, or other raccoon habitat areas, using the following precautions:
 - Wear gloves or use a plastic bag when picking up the baits.
 - Wash your hands after any skin contact with a damaged bait.

Visit our website to find out what to do if your pet eats a bait and for more information regarding raccoons and rabies.

2. In an effort to protect our residents, the Green Tree Police Department has created a Safe Zone in the rear parking lot at the Green Tree Municipal Center. Residents conducting online business transactions with strangers are encouraged to meet at this location for exchange of goods. Parents exchanging custody of children may also utilize the area. Although there may not always be a police presence, the area is identified by signage and is under 24/7 video surveillance.



3. If you haven't already heard, the new car seat law took effect in Pennsylvania on August 12th. Children, ages 2 and younger, must be fastened in a rear-facing child passenger restraint system to be used until the child outgrows the maximum height and weight designated by their car seat's manufacturer. The Green Tree Police Department has officers certified to do free car seat installation and inspections for residents. Please call 412-921-8624 to make an appointment to verify your car seat is correctly and securely installed in your vehicle.

Vehicle Fires GT Volunteer Fire Company

The Green Tree Volunteer Fire Company has responded to an increased number of vehicle fires in the past year. Should this ever happen to you, we hope that the following knowledge and tips will keep you safe.

Facts:

- U.S. fire departments respond to an average of 287,000 vehicle fires per year. These fires cause an estimated 480 civilian deaths, 1,525 civilian injuries, and \$1.3 billion in direct property damage annually.
- Older teens and young adults are the age groups at the highest risk of vehicle fire-related death.
- Three-quarters of highway vehicle fires resulted from mechanical or electrical failures or malfunctions. Collisions caused only 3% of these fires, but 58% of the associated deaths.
- One-third of non-fatal vehicle fire injuries occur when civilians attempt to fight the fire themselves.

Rules of the Road:

STOP: If possible, pull to the side of the road and turn off the ignition. Put the vehicle in park and set the emergency brake.

KEEP THE HOOD CLOSED: Opening the hood allows more oxygen to feed the fire.

GET OUT: Make sure everyone gets out of the vehicle safely. Move away from the vehicle to a safe location. Try to stay upwind from the smoke and uphill to avoid any leaking gasoline or fluids.

CALL 911: Once you are in a safe position, call for help. Do not try to fight the fire yourself. Vehicle fires can present a challenge even for properly trained and equipped firefighters due to the presence of flammable liquids (especially newer gasoline/alcohol blends), synthetic materials (which burn extremely hot), corrosive materials (like battery acid), and explosion hazards (like compressed air cylinders for air bags, pistons for trunks/hoods, and tires).

Proper maintenance can help prevent vehicle fires, so be sure to follow your manufacturer's recommended service schedule. Remember to drive safely and never operate your vehicle if you suspect a mechanical problem.

Recreation & Community Affairs Ron Panza, Chair

Octoberfest is one of Green Tree's largest, social, fundraising events for local groups, which utilizes the talents of the many volunteers, community groups, and local businesses to create a fantastic family event. Residents and non-residents alike have been enjoying this annual event since its inception in 1997. While originally held the first weekend in October under the Recreation & Community Affairs Board, a reorganization occurred in March of 2007 resulting in additional volunteers forming a separate committee and, in 2012 the event was moved to September in hopes of better weather.



Although the Borough of Green Tree commits a substantial amount of funding, the festival depends on the support and participation of local businesses, who are included in all advertising before, during, and after Octoberfest. 



2016 Fall Leaf Collection Schedule

Annual fall leaf collection will begin the week of October 17th through November, weather-permitting. Rake your leaves curbside for collection. Please **DO NOT** rake leaves into the streets since it is a hazard and also a violation of state law.

Carnahan Road, Greentree Road, Mansfield Avenue, McMonagle Avenue, Noblestown Road, Pin Oak Drive, Poplar Street and Potomac Avenue are considered high-traffic roads and residents on those roads **MUST** bag their leaves. Please do not place the bagged leaves at the edge of your yards prior to Thursday evening. Leaves should be at the edge of the yard by 7:00 a.m. on the day of the scheduled collection.

Make certain that your leaf piles are free of twigs, branches, animal waste, and other debris. Leaves only!
